LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading: Wis 7:7-11

A reading from the book of Wisdom.

I prayed, and understanding was given to me.

I called on God, and the Spirit of Wisdom came to me.

I esteemed Wisdom more than power and privilege.

I held riches as nothing compared with Her.
I did not liken Her to a precious stone – it is not Her equal.
All gold is a pinch of sand compared with Her.
Silver ranks as clay beside Her.

I loved Wisdom more than health or beauty.

I preferred Her to the light; Her radiance never sleeps.

In Her company, good things came to me, at Her hands, wealth that cannot be counted. I rejoiced in all Her gifts! Wisdom is their source, though I had not realized She is their Mother.

Second Reading: Heb 4:12-13

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews.

My siblings in Christ:

The word of God is living and active and sharper than any double-edged sword, piercing even to the point of dividing soul from spirit, and joints from marrow; it is able to judge the desires and thoughts of the heart.

And no creature is hidden from God, but everything is naked and exposed to the eyes of the One to whom we must render an account.

Hear what the Spirit is saying to the church. ALL: Thanks be to God.

Gospel: 10:17-27

A proclamation of the Good News according to Matthew.

As Jesus started on his way, someone ran up to him and fell on bended knee, asking. "Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?"

"Why do you call me good?" Jesus answered. "No one is good—except One, God.

You know the commandments: 'Don't murder. Don't commit adultery. Don't steal. Don't lie. Don't cheat. Honor your father and mother.'"

The petitioner answered: "Rabbi, all these I have kept since my childhood."

Jesus looked at, and loved the person before him. "One thing you lack," Jesus said. "Go. Sell all that you have. Give it to those who are poor. You will have treasure in heaven. Then, come, follow me."

At Jesus' response, the one who asked the question became crestfallen and went away grieving, for they had many possessions.

Jesus looked around and said to the disciples, "How hard it is for those who are rich to enter the kin-dom of God!" The disciples were perplexed at these words. Jesus said again, "Children, how hard it is to enter the kin-dom of God! It's easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for one who is rich to enter the kin-dom of God." The disciples were even more stunned, and said to themselves, "Who, then, can be helped?" Looking at them, Jesus said, "For humans, it is impossible, but not with God. All things are possible with God."

Then Peter spoke up, "Rabbi, we've left everything to follow you!" Jesus replied, "Yes. Indeed, no one who has left home or brothers or sisters or mother or father or children or land for me and for the gospel will fail to receive a hundred times as much in this present age: homes, brothers, sisters, mothers, children and land—persecutions too—and in the age to come, everlasting life. But many who are first will be last, and the last will be first."

Reflection

Profession of Faith used at Holy Synod

(based on "Our Truth" by Fr. Michael J. Nicosia and Philippians 2:6-11) < Slide

PRESIDER: While echoing the ancient creeds of our faith, using fresh words to articulate our core beliefs helps us to bring it into dialogue with our present experience of God's activity in our midst. Together we profess what we have received, as it continues to unfold in our midst.

ALL: We believe in God, our Mother out-pouring, our Father uniting, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is seen and yet to be revealed.

Jesus the Christ, although divine in essence, disregarded the image of a lofty God. Instead, Jesus poured himself out, taking on the mantle of a servant.

Born, human in essence, human in every way,
Jesus humbled himself, accepting death on a cross.

Yet even in this, God brought forth new life.

God gave Jesus the name above all other names,
so that all will honor the name of Jesus,
in heaven and on earth and under the earth,
so that every tongue will proclaim
that Jesus the Christ lives and reigns
with peace and love, for the glory of God.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the spirit of truth and giver of life, who with the Father and the Son models equality in diversity and the blessings that proceed from self-giving love.

With the Father and the Son, She is worshiped and glorified.

We believe in the ways She unites us:
through her prophetic challenge,
through the Body of Christ, the Church,
in our shared baptism, in our sacrifices on behalf of others,
in our hope in the resurrection,
and in the fulfillment of God's promise in eternity. Let it be so.

- 4. For all our dearly departed and for those who mourn their passing.

 May Christ's light dawn, and may glory be revealed; we pray: Óyenos mi Dios.
- 5. For whom else or what else shall we pray? ... we pray: *Óyenos mi Dios.*
- All-vulnerable God, in his crucifixion your Son became one with his siblings who are naked and defenseless.

 Hear these prayers and empower our voices and service on their behalf. All this we ask and can do in Jesus' name. Amen.
